Age	milestones
0 — 1year	 Child is easily distracted and their attention easily moves from one thing/person to another. Attention is mostly given to an appealing sensory item
1 - 2years	 Attention is fixed. Child focuses on one thing at a time. Child is able to focus much longer on self-chosen activities. They ignore other distractions to focus on what they are doing. At this point, your child may seem to be ignoring you when you call them.
2 – 3years	 Child still focuses on only one thing at a time but can shift attention to another thing with adult's assistance.
